

An Introduction to Scrooge! The Musical

Welcome to the world of Ebenezer Scrooge! This musical is based on the novella (*A Christmas Carol*) written by the famous English author Charles Dickens in 1843, and it is much more than just a ghost story; it's a powerful message about kindness, forgiveness, and the true meaning of Christmas. Dickens wrote this novella (a short novel) during a time of great change in London, and his story quickly became one of the most beloved holiday tales of all time. This musical is but one of the several forms that novella appears in now.

Meet the Miser: Ebenezer Scrooge

Our story centers on Ebenezer Scrooge (played by Jim Merrell), a man whose name has become synonymous with stinginess. Scrooge is a "miser," a person who hoards wealth and hates spending money. He runs a counting-house (an accounting firm) and cares for nothing but profit. Scrooge hates warmth, generosity, and, most of all, Christmas. His favorite phrase is a dismissive "Humbug!" when anyone mentions the holiday spirit. He refuses to give money to charity, pays his loyal, underpaid clerk **Bob Cratchit** (played by Mac Hackney III) barely enough to survive, and shuns his only living relative, his cheerful **nephew Fred** (played by Donald Falls II). Scrooge's life is defined by isolation and coldness—a reflection of the dark economic times that Dickens wanted to expose.

The Journey of Redemption


Scrooge! The Musical is structured around one extraordinary, life-changing Christmas Eve. **Scrooge** is visited by the ghost of his deceased business partner, **Jacob Marley** (played by George Thagard) who is doomed to wander the earth, bound by the heavy chains forged from his own greed in life. Marley warns Scrooge that he faces a similar, terrible fate unless he changes his ways. Marley announces that Scrooge will be visited by three spirits:

The Ghost of Christmas Past: This spirit (played by Elana Woodall) takes Scrooge on a journey back through his own life, reminding him of his lost innocence, lost love, and the moments when he chose wealth over happiness.

The Ghost of Christmas Present: This spirit (played by Charles Prosser) shows Scrooge how others—his nephew, Bob Cratchit, and the world outside—celebrate Christmas, revealing the joy and warmth he misses out on, and introducing the heartbreaking sight of Tiny Tim, Bob Cratchit's sick son.

The Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come: This terrifying, silent phantom (played by Jackson Blankenship) shows Scrooge the shadows of the future: what will happen if he does not change. He witnesses the miserable, unmourned death of a lonely man—himself. In the song "Thank You Very Much" lead by Tom Jenkins (played by Logan Spradley) Scrooge's debtors cheer his passing.

This supernatural journey forces Scrooge to confront the consequences of his choices. *A Christmas Carol* is, at its heart, a powerful story about transformation. Dickens shows us that it is never too late to change, to choose kindness over cruelty, and to find the joy that comes from caring for others.



Lasting Impact

A Christmas Carol was an instant sensation and had a real impact on Victorian society, inspiring increased charity and a greater focus on generosity during the holidays. It helped shape many of the Christmas traditions we still recognize today, proving that a single story can truly change the world.

You have a good mix of holiday cheer and thoughtfulness. Like Fred or Tiny Tim, you're spreading kindness and enjoying the season in your own way.


40-50 points: Spirit of Christmas Cheer
